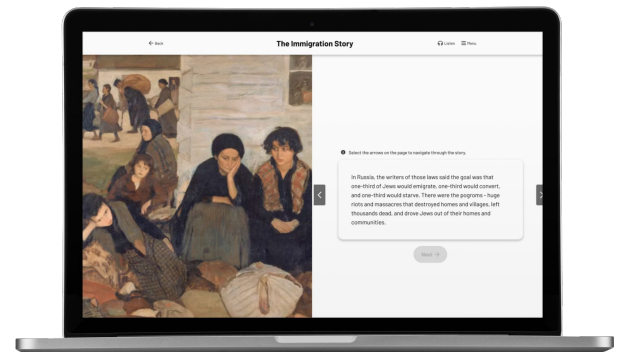


## Allyship & Understanding

*BINAH: Building Insights to Navigate Antisemitism & Hate* is a digital course developed in partnership with the Anti-Defamation League that motivates students to identify as global citizens with respect for all people, regardless of the makeup of their school community. Students learn through short real-world stories, helping them engage in topics like the Holocaust, the lives of Hasidic Jews, immigration and antisemitic acts in America. These personal stories help students build empathy, perspective-taking and allyship.

## LESSON SCOPE AND SEQUENCE

- The Early Story** - In the first three stories, learners will look at the history of antisemitism with a specific focus on how it evolved over time and persisted throughout many communities and parts of society.

**Story 1:** The Immigration Story

**Story 2:** Antisemitism in the U.S. Post-WWII

**Story 3:** Jewish Integration

- Modern Jewish Life** - In these stories, students develop an understanding that the Jewish community is made up of many types of people, in no way monolithic, and all Jews have their own perspective on current events.

**Story 4:** Cultural Jewish Practice

**Story 5:** Practice of Jewish Life in America: Orthodox

**Story 6:** Practice of Jewish Life in America: Jewish People of Color

- The Impact of Antisemitism** - In these stories, students will develop a response to an instance of antisemitism. Students explore a series of topics that graduate from the personal impact of stereotypes to the violence bias and prejudice can cause.

- Being an Ally** - In these stories, students will develop an understanding of the subtleties of antisemitic language. They will explore how Jewish people may look for help from allies and what it means to be an ally to the Jewish community.
