What is EVERFI?

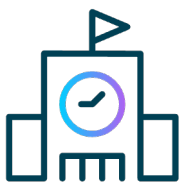

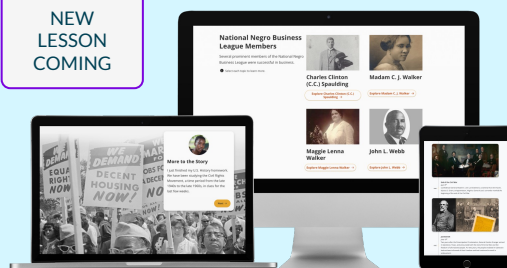

Incorporating Year-Round

Why is learning Black history important?

Learning Black history helps to promote understanding and awareness of the diverse experiences and perspectives of Black individuals. By learning about the challenges and triumphs of Black individuals throughout history, students can gain a deeper understanding of the world around them and develop empathy and compassion for others. In addition to promoting understanding and empathy, learning Black history can also help students develop a sense of pride and belonging. For Black students, seeing their own history and culture represented in the curriculum can be empowering and help them feel a sense of connection to their heritage. For non-Black students, learning about Black history can help them understand and appreciate the rich cultural contributions of Black individuals and communities.

How can educators effectively teach Black history all year long?

Incorporate Black history into existing lesson plans

One way to teach Black history is incorporating it into existing lesson plans. For example, a history teacher could discuss the role of Black individuals in key historical events, or an English teacher could include works by Black authors in their reading lists.

Create interdisciplinary units

Another option is to create interdisciplinary units that focus on Black history. These units can include a variety of subjects, such as art, music, and literature, and can allow students to explore different aspects of Black history in greater depth.

Engage students in research and discussion

Educators can encourage students to engage in research and discussion around Black history. This can include having students conduct research projects on Black historical figures / events or facilitating discussions about the impact of Black History on society.

Encourage students to create their own content

Educators can encourage students to create their own content related to Black history. This can include writing essays or creating art, music, or other multimedia projects that reflect their own interpretations and understandings of Black history.

How can educators incorporate Black history curriculum across subjects?

Math

Educators who teach math can focus on incorporating biographies of Black mathematicians into their lessons or highlighting the contributions of Black mathematicians to specific mathematical concepts or fields.

Science

Educators who teach science can discuss the contributions of Black scientists and inventors; teach about the impact of science on Black communities; or use a variety of teaching resources, such as books, articles, and videos, that feature Black scientists.

Art

Educators who teach art can include artists from different time periods and art movements, such as Harlem Renaissance artists like Jacob Lawrence and Romare Bearden, or contemporary artists like Kehinde Wiley and Kara Walker.

Music

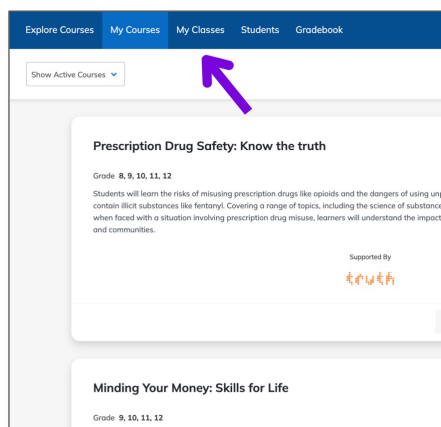
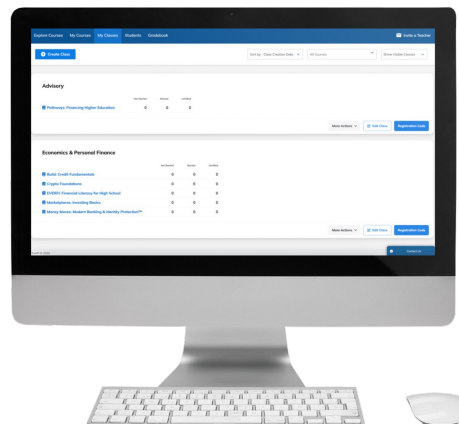
Educators who teach music can focus on the works of Black musicians; engage with the music of specific historical periods or events; or expose students to a range of musical styles that have been developed and influenced by Black community.

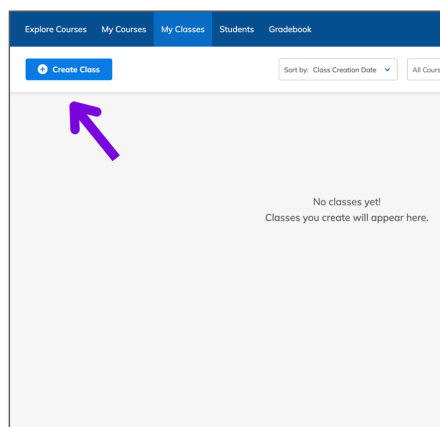

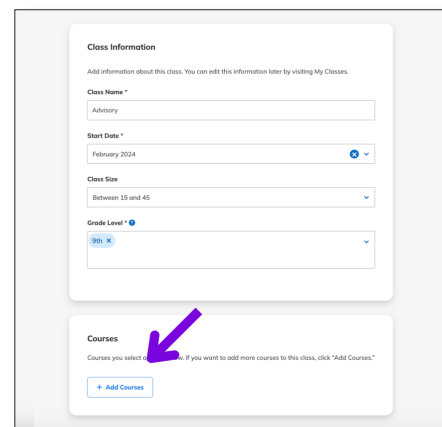
